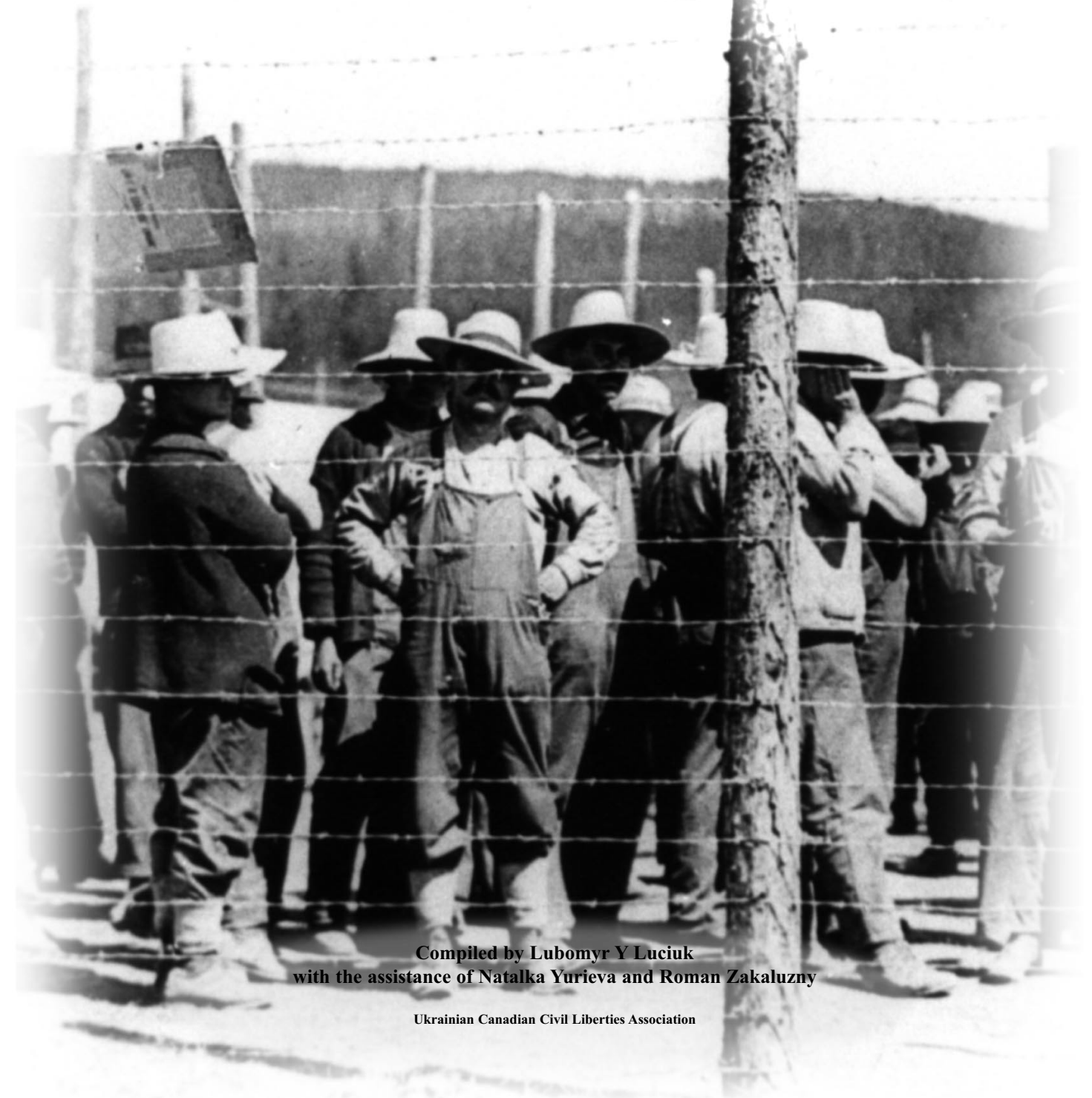

Lest We Forget



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Note on the compilation of Roll Call

We have made every attempt to avoid duplicating internees' names. Yet the aim of *Roll Call* is to be as inclusive as possible. This has proven to be a difficult chore, given the many different ways in which the internees' names were recorded, the movement of internees between camps and the new identity numbers they were assigned in each location, the destruction of most individual prisoners' dockets, and the continuing reluctance of survivors' families to be forthcoming with whatever documentation remains in private hands. When in doubt we have opted to preserve a name on this rooster rather than delete anyone, in keeping with one of the purposes of this research paper captured in its subtitle, *Lest We Forget*.

While our focus was to record the names of Ukrainian and other eastern European civilian internees, rather than those of German or Austrian German prisoners of war, we have included the names of the children and women who were imprisoned alongside their menfolk, irrespective of nationality or citizenship. Similarly, we have provided the aliases used by some internees, the latter being listed as *aka*

("also known as"). Where information exists about an individual's fate (e.g. *escaped*) we have added it, even though we are very much aware of just how incomplete these insights into the internees' experiences are, given the above-referenced destruction of so many files of the Office of Internment Operations. We also note that it was not always clear whether a date shown in the surviving documentation referred to a date of imprisonment, release, or parole. We have provided whatever dates are available and, if possible, indicated the meaning of that date for the individual prisoner. In most cases the date refers to a release or parole date. We have also tried to list all of the camps in which an individual was held.

As noted in the *Foreword* we intend to further develop *Roll Call*.
